

Finding the Right Balance

I have learned over the years that there is a life lesson to be found in everything under the sun, that includes in our Jewish leap year.

A whole month (Adar I) is added this year so Passover, the "spring holiday" as

it is called in the Torah, actually occurs in the spring, rather than travels around the solar year, as it would in a purely lunar calendar (as do Ramadan and Lunar New Year.) Our calendrical adjustment is about finding the right balance between the lunar and solar cycles, yet it carries a powerful lesson for all aspects of our lives!

All Judaism is about finding the right balance: The balance between enjoying our food and being thoughtful about what we eat (kashrut). The balance between work and rest (Shabbat). The balance between taking care of ourselves and taking care of others (gemilut hasadim, kindness, and tzedakah, charity and justice). The balance between particularism, pride in the Jewish People and our Jewish identity, and universalism, appreciation for humanity's ethnic and religious diversity and recognition that we are all equally children of the same Creator.

Discrimination and divisiveness continue to rise. Yet, the overwhelming community support at our Vigil in memory of those killed in Squirrel Hill reminds us that the desire to balance particularism and universality is not ours alone. The Vigil also showed us that we here at Beth Shalom have a special role and responsibility for raising up this message of balance in our community and our world. That is why this past fall we discussed how to talk thoughtfully about Israel (a particular concern for the Iewish community) and why this coming spring we will be one of three centralized sites hosting Conversation Circles designed to build stronger alliances and deeper understanding with our neighbors of all ethnic, racial and religious identities. We have many new partners of all faiths, ethnicities and racial affiliations. Many participated in the Vigil this past fall. We also will be going deeper this year in our conversations. Training for facilitator volunteers begins in January, our communal kick off event, and the conversation circles themselves in the Spring. (See details within for how to join the conversation!)

Finding the right balance can be difficult. But, as our ancestors discovered long ago, finding the right balance can enrich our lives and those of our families and even help heal the world.

A couple of weeks ago, I went to Beth Shalom for an evening meeting. There was a man I didn't know waiting by the door. When I asked him who he was and why he was waiting, he told me that he was from Temple Isaiah. He had make it your business to support our evening minyans. recently lost his father and came to Beth Shalom to say Kaddish, because we are the only congregation in Howard County that has an evening egalitarian minyan.

This incident brought home to me how important it is to have a cohesive Jewish community in our area. We aren't just Beth Shalomers, or Temple Isaiah members, or unaffiliated. We are Jews - of a Jewish community. Beth Shalom's minyan serves all Jews in Howard County, not just our congregation. Over the past year, several non-members have attended our minyan, because they needed to feel a part of that community.

That night, there was a small turn out for the minyan. Those attending the meeting stepped in to make up the requisite ten adult Jews for saying Kaddish. The man from Temple Isaiah thanked us for being there for him.

But it could have easily turned out differently. Had there not been enough people in the building for a meeting, we couldn't have made a minyan. There are several members of our own congregation who are currently saying Kaddish for a parent. There are those who want to attend the minyan on a yahrtzeit, and there are people who are just want to come for the short evening service.

The service is only about 15 minutes, so even with travel time, it isn't a huge time commitment to attend minyan once or twice a month. The minyan begins at 7:15 on Sunday and 7:30 Monday-Thursday, and our dedicated minyan leaders try to make sure it starts on time. It is also

an opportunity to see people you may not have seen for a while, or to meet someone new.

I am asking you, all of the members of Beth Shalom, to There is a rotation, based on last initial, but people rarely come when they are assigned. If your assigned dates are difficult, come on other dates. Come once a month, or on occasions when you are in the area, or have a class or meeting at the shul. Come when you have a yahrtzeit, and ask your family and friends to come to support you.

Think of it this way: Beth Shalom's evening minyan is really Howard County's egalitarian minyan. We serve the community, and it is mitzvah, and a privilege to be able to do so.

In other news: Our building expansion is just about completed. The four new classrooms are already in use for the Religious School, and we're working on future plans for using the extra space we now have for Adult programming on Sunday mornings, and we have a team to put together a curriculum for a Sunday Pre-kindergarten class to start in the fall.

On behalf of the Officers and the Board of Trustees, I thank all of you who have generously donated to the Expansion fund, and funded dedications for the expansion. There are still opportunities to contribute toward the furnishings and to dedicate items. If you are interested in donating toward the new classrooms, please contact our Treasurer, Susan Kuning.

Happy new year to all of you. I wish you all the best in 2019.

Education by Dr. Louis Nagel

The Arts and Creativity in Schools is the theme of this month's issue of the professional journal, Educational Leadership. The introductory statement includes a quote, "Seeing like an artist means seeing things in new and different ways." That well sums up our goals for our Jewish Cultural Arts Initiative which has

moved into its second year. We began this effort with a focus on the visual arts. Sixth graders learned about Pesach traditions of Kiddush (four cups), Elijah and Miriam. The next step was to choose and carry out their interpretation of cups for fulfilling either of those holiday rituals. A recent activity for kindergartners and first graders, was making mezzuzot. These projects were opportunities to advance the goals of experiential learning, primarily, connecting content learning to an artistic endeavor; instruction on traditions and rituals with a creative component. A bonus, in these cases, were products of lasting utility, traditional ritual objects.

Last year we brought drama into the mix. A local theater director, Susan Brall, joined our faculty. Most of the activities she presented connected to Bible or holiday curricula. One exercise centered on narratives like the Maccabees and others on the stories told in Megillat Esther and Exodus. Further broadening this addition, a number of theatrical scripts were conducted in the High Holy Day youth programs. A recent series of lessons advanced this year's Middot (Jewish Ethics) project with improvisations connected to the values of Ometz Lev (inner courage), Hakarat Hatov (recognizing the good) and Hesed (kindness).

Our music program has made great strides with the addition of Cantor Apt to the Religious School staff. Among the early indications of the potential for this dimension to the Initiative were student presentations for Hanukkat HaTalmidim (formerly called kindergarten consecration), an annual 3rd-5th grade concert at Harmony Hall and our school-wide Hanukkah Zimriyah (songfest). There is little that better communicates internalizing a concept than seeing a child singing with passion and energy, no song sheet to be seen.

Culinary arts, mostly conducted by collaboration of congregant Eve Klein and 7th grade teacher, Jane Goldberg fit in well with this curriculum project. This year we added rikudei am (Israeli folk dancing) and yoga to our offerings. Both have been positively received and have great potential as modes for exploring Judaism.

I look forward to the ongoing development of the Jewish Cultural Arts Initiative. Our early successes have made it clear that broadening the approaches to educational experience serves to engage the widest range of learners. We are nurturing unique, groundbreaking synagogue school practices. It began with seed money from the Sisterhood, whose support for the school in this and other efforts has been impactful. We know our tradition encourages pursuing these dimensions to enrich Jewish learning. In the spirit of emulating God, we are acting on the first words of Torah, *Bereshit bara - Creation*.




