

Being Jewish in Difficult Times By Rabbi Susan Grossman

I am writing this article just days after 11 Shabbat worshippers were killed in a Pittsburgh synagogue in the deadliest anti-Semitic attack in US history. The outpouring of support from our community and the overflow crowd inside and outside Beth Shalom Monday

night after the shooting reminded us that unity can triumph over division, hope over despair and love over hate. By the time you read this, the victims will have been buried; the news cycle will have moved on. What is next for us as American Jews? Like other synagogues, we have tightened our security precautions. But there is more we can do.

The shooter killed Jews because a Jewish organization, HIAS, helps immigrants. Where one group is targeted, others will be, so hate cannot be confronted in a vacuum. Knowing this, Beth Shalom has helped bring together public school and local officials and our extensive network of interfaith partners to confront anti-Semitism, and all forms of bias, in our schools and community. Every interfaith program we participate in, whether directly with other congregations like our recent Conversation circles, or through PATH, People Acting Together in Howard County, like our Teen Interfaith Initiative, helps build mutual respect, understanding, and an alliance against hate. All these efforts are critical to the new reality of Jewish life in today's America. (Please contact me or our Social Action chairs to get involved.)

But the most important thing we can do in the face of rising anti-Semitism and equal opportunity intolerance is to be the best Jews we can be. We can emulate, in all our interpersonal interactions, the highest Jewish values of treating everyone as a child of God deserving of respect (*kavod*) and kindness (*gemilut hasadim*) and can support each other and the Jewish institutions that are there for us by living as richly a Jewish life as possible, attending synagogue services and programs more regularly, and celebrating Jewish tradition with pride and inviting our neighbors and friends to join us.

Hanukkah comes in mid-December, shortly after Thanksgiving, the quintessential American holiday. Like us, the Maccabees were religious moderates, proud Jews who were part of wider (then Hellenistic) society. In the face of fear and persecution, they held onto our ancient traditions as proud Jews. If not for them, we might not be here today. May their example inspire us with the confidence and pride to meet the challenges we face as Jews today. Beth Shalom's 2018-2019 Adult Education curriculum is in full swing. There are new and stimulating classes, speakers, and activities still forthcoming!

Please join us the weekend of **Friday, November 2** -**Sunday, November 4** for our annual Scholar-in-Residence program on Genetics and Judaism. World renown geneticist, Dr. Rebekah Rasooly from the N.I.H. joins us beginning Friday night at 7:00 pm with her speech *Genetics and Judaism: From Moses to Molecular DNA*.

During services on Saturday morning, Rabbi Grossman will moderate a discussion with Dr. Rasooly on areas of convergence between the scientific and Jewish approaches to understanding human identity, behavior and traits. After services, join us for further conversations with Dr. Rasooly and a light Kiddush.

New classes for the 2018-2019 year will launch in September, including:

- * Cantor Rebecca Pohl Apt will lead a new class *Living on a Prayer: Making Meaning out of Our Service, Part 1* on Tuesdays beginning October 23, 30, and November 13 and 20 at 7:45-9:15 p.m. Come and learn about the beautiful poems, prayers and psalms of Shabbat liturgy. Learn about Kabbalat Shabbat, the Shema and its blessings, the Shabbat Amidah, and more! Open for all levels of Hebrew.
- Israel: From Ancient History to Modern Headlines, led by Rabbi Grossman and features guest speakers, will explore the intersection of history, politics, and polemics. This fascinating, fast paced series is designed to provide participants with the myth busting facts and nuanced context to make sense of contemporary social and political challenges facing Israel today. Sessions will cover the unbroken history of Jews living in the Land of Israel from ancient to modern days; the building and establishment of the modern State of Israel relative to the Arab-Israeli Conflict; Israel and the Palestinians; and what you need to know to talk thoughtfully about Israel today.

An excerpted version of the State of the Shul from Yom Kippur. Our congregation is Moving Forward. As we look back at the past year, we can see that we have come a long way, and as we look forward, we see that we have a clear path ahead.

Cantor Richard Walters, who served us for over 20 years, retired in June, becoming our first Cantor Emeritus. In July, we welcomed Cantor Rebecca Apt. She brings us her own unique style, and a new energy and spirit to our bema while still maintaining our traditions.

Our building is expanding. Despite rain delays during this wet summer, the construction has forged ahead. You can peek into the construction at the end of the classroom wing and see the progress. When completed, this space will give us room to create a Sunday Pre-kindergarten, and hold Adult classes and special events on Sunday mornings.

We have new Youth leadership, who will assist our Youth committee and volunteers with programming for all ages, from our Shorashim programs for the youngest, to USY for our High Schoolers. The Teen Interfaith initiative, which brings together teens from 4 different faiths to learn about each other, and share insights, is entering its third year. These young people are forging a future for our community, a future of tolerance and understanding that can only add to Tikkun Olam.

Last fall, the Adult Education committee gave us a wonderful Artist in Residence weekend with Mordecai Rosenstein. The poster, painted by congregants under Mordechai's direction, reminds us of all the good we can do together. This year, our Scholar in Residence, world renown geneticist Dr. Rebekah Rasooly, will lead a weekend of programs exploring the relationship between Judaism and Science, concepts of inheritance, and the convergence of scientific and Jewish approaches to understanding human identity.

Beginning his third year as Education director, Dr. Nagel is building the school's curriculum around Jewish ethical values to help our children live the values that they learn from their parents and teachers. The Religious School has gone through growth and change under the leadership of Dr. Louis Nagel.

Our Social Action committee had an active year. Over the summer our volunteers conducted a school supply drive, and took part in the High Holiday food drive. On Rosh Hashanah, we asked for donations for those in our community who are food-insecure. You responded, as you have in the past, with overwhelming generosity. Beth Shalom donated over 1500 pounds of food.

Last winter we partnered with Kittamaqundi Community Church for a week of Cold Weather Shelter, and will do so again this coming March. Our congregants provide supplies, volunteers, drivers and support. We also go to the Elizabeth House, a soup kitchen, to serve dinners on the 5th Thursdays of a month. There is always room for more volunteers. Beth Shalom participated in "Courageous Conversation" sessions – an interracial, interfaith program to bring people together to talk openly and honestly with each other about racism and religious intolerance in our community. Rabbi Grossman helped create this innovative and important program to combat the rising incivilities in our community.

Our congregation has been a leader in the community in other ways. On Rosh Hashanah, Rabbi Grossman told us about the Masorti /Israel Bond initiative. Now her sermon "Combating Extremism in Israel" has gone national! We can all support religious pluralism in Israel by supporting Masorti, the Conservative movement in Israel.

Beth Shalomers are finding each other and getting to know each other in interesting ways. There are several groups forming to bring like-minded individuals together - the board game group, the Chosen Meeples, meets once a month on a Shabbat after services, to enjoy playing high level games together. There is a bicycling group forming, and photography club. And Men's Club and Sisterhood both offer programs and projects that bring us together.

Now, it seems that every speech you heard over the High Holidays asked you for something. I, too, have an ask, but I'm not asking for money. I'm asking you to do something this year for YOU. Something that will enhance your life and well being. I am asking you to Connect, Engage, and Commit to Beth Shalom.

Connect: Look around, do you see someone you don't know? Or someone you'd like to know better? Introduce yourself, strike up a conversation. Make a new friend. And carry it forward... How about inviting your new friend out for a cup of coffee, or a walk around the lake, or to join you at services or at the upcoming Art Auction or adult ed class.

Engage: There are so many opportunities to become involved in Beth Shalom. Services – yes, of course. Including Ask the Rabbi, Torah Talks, and Friday night speakers. There are Adult Ed classes, and social events, Men's Club trips and Sisterhood's Chick Flick. If you have children in the Religious School, you can join your kids on family education and "Judaism and Java" with Rabbi Grossman. There are the affinity groups that I mentioned, biking, board games, and others. Or start your own. In a congregation this size, you're sure to find someone who shares an interest with you.

Commit: Engage in your community, by coming to the weekday minyans a few times during the year. Offer a ride to someone who wants to come for Shabbat. Volunteer to help set up for Shabbat and Religious School. Help out at the Cold Weather Shelter. Make yourself different, by making a difference.

The Women's League Torah Fund theme this year is ATID, Future. That is where we are going - Into the Future, together as a congregation. I have looked back to see where we've come from, and I look forward to seeing where we will go, together.

What is Hanukkah? I wish I could claim some originality in posing this question, but the query was first put forward about two thousand years ago (Talmud, Shabbat 21b). The definitive answer has yet to make its claim. There are a wide variety of scholarly answers, but sometimes the best path to follow is to turn inward and ask

the more personally reflective question, "What is Hanukkah to me?"

In some ways, Hanukkah inspires inner turmoil, a call for ambivalence or derision. "It is a minor holiday," some will say or a reaction to that glitzy, highly commercialized holiday that takes place around the same time making our observance more complicated. None of this should be the case.

It has been over two millennia since that original Talmudic discussion. Over that time, the holiday has maintained the attention of the great sages of their day including Maimonides and Rashi and on to today. Like many historic events its significance is continually reinterpreted for contemporary meaning.

One stream of thought is that Mattathias, Judah, and his brothers were the leaders of a revolution. It was a twofronted conflict. The external foe was Antiochus IV and his imposition of Hellenist culture. At the same time there was an internal clash between Jewish Hellenizers and the traditionalist Hasidim. It is not a great stretch to say that if the Maccabees had not won their guerrilla war, rededicated the Temple, and regained control of their country, Judaism would not have survived, monotheism would have been extinguished and the three faith traditions that have shaped the modern world would not have made it beyond the early days of the Roman Empire. To me, Hanukkah represents an incomparable turning point in human history. Beyond that, at Hanukkah celebrations I met two of the people who most changed my life, it is the source of some of my sweetest family memories, I have chanted *L'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah* on four continents and consumed latkes beyond counting. It is the holiday I most look forward to celebrating. What is Hanukkah to you?

Hanukkah at Beth Shalom is something extraordinary. Cantor Apt has gotten into the spirit, enhancing the children's Hanukkah musical repertoire in preparation for several big events. Hanukkah Tunes and Tales (a Shorashim program) will be on Sunday, December 2; 4:00-5:00 pm at Barnes and Noble. Hanukkah Extravaganza (K-7th grades) is on Sunday, December 9th. We begin with a songfest at 11:00 am; parents and family are invited to join us. The event transitions into a carnival (12:00-1:30 pm). We have long ago built the mitzvah of respecting the elderly into the holiday with a concert/visit to Harmony Hall (3rd-5th graders, Wednesday, December 5 - during Religious School hours). One of the more exciting events will be Hanukat HaTalmidim, a celebration of our kindergartners beginning their formal Jewish education, at the congregational Shabbat service on December 8th.

Jewish Women's Prison Project Update

The Jewish Women's Prison Project is a study group that takes place in the Maryland Correctional Institution for Women, the maximum security Prison for woman in Jessup, MD. The group is comprised of currently incarcerated women and community members from Beth Shalom Synagogue in Columbia, Maryland.

The curriculum includes discussions and text study based on the Talmud and Torah as well as articles from news outlets and blogs. The group delves into a wide spectrum of issues, from ancient questions to modern discussions on domestic violence, #MeToo, and food justice. Each part of the curriculum is designed to encourage everyone to engage and to think critically. We decided to include current events because we want to enforce the notion that the women who are currently incarcerated are still valued members of the community- the Jewish community, the American community and the global community. To that end, we hope to encourage confidence in the currently incarcerated women that their lived experiences, as well as their thoughtful contemplation of the issues we discuss, make each of them essential to the discussion.

Incarcerated people are often treated in ways that tell them that they as individuals do not matter, that they are beyond redemption and undeserving of care and kindness. The Jewish Women's Prison Project is working to combat that
